NZ Resuscitation Council updates

New Guidelines—these are expected from December, following the release of ILCOR's consensus on science and treatment recommendations. A fuller update will be given at Conference.

Meeting our needs—The NZ Resuscitation Council is very keen to ensure appropriate involvement with bystander, first aid and first responder rescuers. Council will be seeking feedback in the coming months and will appreciate hearing your thoughts about how it can better meet our members' needs and what works well. More on this at our Conference.

ANZCOR First Aid Guidelines—AECTP has provided feedback for the next four NZ Resuscitation Council First Aid Guidelines (9.2.7 Anaphylaxis; 9.2.5 Asthma; 9.4.3 Envenomation; 9.1.3 Burns) which are currently being discussed for co-badging with ARC prior to being released onto the NZRC website later in 2015.

NZQA representatives attended an AECTP Board Meeting

NZQA representatives accepted our invitation and attended a recent board meeting in Christchurch.

The attendees from NZQA were: Jane von Dadelszen (Deputy CE & Lead of Quality Assurance Division), Rebecca Boyack (Manager, Risk Management), Julia Parrott (Business Analyst).

We had a good, frank, open exchange of concerns and considerations over a 2 hour meeting. We covered a range of topics including, category 3 providers and subcontracting issues, pre-course material accuracy and validity, 26551/26552 length and time of expiry, and refresher courses. Also covered were areas of where NZQA responsibility stops and starts and what The Skills Organisation are picking up on.

The Board felt the meeting clarified lines of communication and areas of responsibility and we are far clearer around who we should send letters and queries too when acting on behalf of the membership.

It was noted and appreciated that NZQA provided an excellent level of representation and took time to travel to Christchurch to meet with the Board.

AECTP being recognised as a peak provider has helped us establish an appropriate professional working relationship with NZQA for which our members will gain benefit.

Secretarial assistance — The Board has agreed to obtaining secretarial assistance where appropriate and Wendy Blount has kindly offered to help out, which is much appreciated.

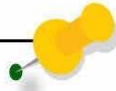

NZQA Announcement: A 'Universal' Record of Achievement

consultation feedback closed 28 Apr 2015

In March and April 2015, NZQA sought feedback from the tertiary education sector on a new proposal to expand the current Record of Achievement into a 'Universal' Record of Achievement (URoA).

The URoA would be an accessible, accurate, comprehensive and authoritative record of a learner's qualifications and other quality assured learning that is recognised in New Zealand.

Feedback was sought on:

- the perceived benefits and challenges of developing a URoA
- the mechanisms used to record New Zealand qualifications until the process is automated.

Respondents gave feedback on the discussion paper [Expanding the Record of Achievement \(PDF, 499KB\)](#).

Summary of submissions and consultation feedback

NZQA received submissions from teachers, wānanga, private training establishments, institutes of technology and polytechnics, the Tertiary Education Commission, the Industry Training Federation and Ako Aotearoa.

Substantial support for the idea

Respondents acknowledged the potential benefits stated in the above discussion paper and endorsed an expanded record of achievement by education organisations for the following reasons:

- A strong consensus on having the new New Zealand qualifications recorded on the record of achievement, as it is a logical move following the Targeted Review of Qualifications.
- The ease of use of a unique and authoritative document leading to a greater and clearer picture of overall achievement for the learner.
- Achievement of skills (regardless of where they were obtained) coexisting on a learner's record will assist with better cross-sector collaboration and recognising formal and informal learning.
- It will assist tertiary education organisations when enrolling new learners, and help with records management.

The cost and organisational impact of implementing the URoA for tertiary education organisations needs to be minimal.

Recording the new New Zealand qualifications

The mechanisms used to record New Zealand qualifications until the process is automated did not generate many comments. A slight majority of education organisations favoured the extraction of information from existing data returns and education organisations verifying the information to be recorded. What is coming next?

In the meantime, NZQA has work underway to look at options for recording New Zealand qualifications and the approach, cost and system requirements to record achievement of all qualifications listed on the New Zealand Qualifications Framework (NZQF).

NZQA is engaging with learners and is receiving their feedback on how an expanded record of achievement could be useful to them and what learners would want to be recorded on it.

As work continues to progress, NZQA will communicate on:

- what it has learned about what learners want and the URoA's functionality to be developed to meet their need
- how privacy and security requirements will be met
- the approach taken to recognise non-NZQF learning.

Member Q & A—FA Review SSB responsibilities

Member's question: What changes can we all expect now that The Skills Organisation was granted gazetted coverage for First Aid in late March 2015?

From The Skills Organisation:

The standard-setting body (SSB) responsibilities for First Aid unit standards 6400, 6401, 6402, 26551, 26552 and 24549 has been transferred from NZQA National Qualifications Services to The Skills Organisation (who already have responsibility for pre-hospital emergency care).

The FA Unit Standards Review — is progressing well, with 6400, 6401 and 6402 being reinstated following a review with some updates; while 26551 and 26552 are being expired. This will be listed on the Skills website shortly, and will indicate that the 6400 series is the preferred first aid training for all.

Education organisations with consent to assess for unit standards 26551 and 26552 only, will automatically have their consent to assess extended to include unit standards 6400, 6401 and 6402.

To allow for industry training organisations with qualifications containing 26551 and 26552, a last date for assessment of 31 December 2019 has been set, however the recommendation is that 6400 series is completed instead.

External Moderation — will now be conducted by The Skills Organisation; who will contact education organisations who have indicated to NZQA that they will be assessing First Aid standards to confirm national external moderation requirements for 2015.

The Training Requirements document— [First Aid as a Life Skill: Training Requirements for Quality Provision of Unit Standards-based First Aid Training \(PDF, 60KB\)](#) remains current. Education organisations with NZQA accreditation to train and assess first aid must continue to meet the requirements.

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CMR for First Aid (Ref: 0230) - The Skills Organisation has completed the revision of the Consent and Moderation Requirements (CMR). Enquires to 0508 SKILLS or support@skills.org.nz:

Date new version published June 2015— The next CMR review is planned to take place during 2016. See the Skills website for details.

Summary of Revision— The Skills Organisation is now the Standing Setting Body for First Aid, and as such a revision of CMR 0230 was required in order to align it with Skills practices of Consent and Moderation Requirements.

Compliance with new requirements— Requirements for consent to assess will apply with effect from June 2015.

Moderation system requirements will apply with effect from June 2015.

Organisations with consent to assess will be expected to be able to demonstrate compliance with the CMR from December 2015 onwards.

MAIN CHANGES

Requirements for Consent to Assess (RCA) - Standard Setting Body involvement in process for granting consent to assess. Changes made to reflect that a visit is only required at level 3 and above. Visit waiver conditions (see website).

Inclusion of the following: where an organisation with consent to assess wants to extend an existing consent to assess and has a record of successful delivery and assessment, or, where the level of consent to assess sought, combined with low numbers of unit standards, does not warrant a visit.

Industry or sector-specific requirements for consent to assess—No significant changes have been made to Criteria 1, 2, 3, or 8, other than reference to Skills.

Moderation Requirements (MR)

Moderation System—The Skills moderation system has been incorporated to align requirements with Skill current practice. Skills will monitor the NZQA credit reporting schedule so there will now be no requirement for TEOs to submit an assessment plan.

Reporting— Skills reporting requirements have been included to align this section with current practice.

Funding— The associated costs of pre-assessment moderation have been inserted to align funding requirements with current practice.

Non-compliance with moderation requirements — The Skills non-compliance process has been included to align requirements with current practice.

Appeals — The Skills Appeals process has been included to align this section with current practice.
